

General Human Rights Situation:	According to Albania's Country Report on Human Rights Practices for 2014 of the United States Department of State the most significant human rights problems are: - Corruption of government, particularly within the judicial and health-care systems.			
	 Domestic violence and discrimination against women. Police beating and otherwise mistreating suspects during detention and interrogation, elicit confessions; prolonged police detention without charge; substandard prison conditions. Little progress in addressing claims for the return or restitution of property seized 			
	during the former communist era A disproportionately high ratio of male-to-female births indicated that gender-			
	biased sex selection might be occurring. - There were many displaced children and street children, particularly within the			
	Romani community Source and destination country for men, women, and children subjected to sex trafficking and forced labour.			
	- Marginalization and abuse of the Romani and Balkan-Egyptian communities.			

	 Discrimination based on sexual orientation and gender identity. Government enforcement of labour laws remained weak and rarely protected domestic and migrant workers.
General Human Rights Situation:	 Large numbers of children were engaged in forced labour. Discrimination in employment or occupation against individuals based on their gender, presence of a disability, sexual orientation or gender identity, nationality, and ethnicity. Impunity
